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REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st MARCH 1986

After three difficult years it is pleasing to report that the Institute has turned its accumulated deficit into a small surplus. Whereas the deficit at 31st March 1983 was R89 059, we showed a surplus of R20 578 at 31st March 1986. It is particularly encouraging that the Institute has been able to achieve this at a time when racial tension in South Africa was increasing.

Income and expenditure during the year ended 31st March 1986 both increased by 26%. The outstanding feature of our financial performance was the increase in membership income of 57%, so vindicating a decision taken by the Council of the Institute at the beginning of 1984 following a strategic planning review to broaden Institute membership and build financial stability upon subscription fees. The Institute's established individual membership responded generously to a substantial increase in fees while a vigorous enrolment campaign in the private sector and among non-profit-making organisations yielded very encouraging results.

An expanded range of publications was made available to members, among them the 1984 <u>Race Relations Survey</u>, which, at about a thousand pages, was the largest ever produced. A variety of speakers gave lectures or addressed briefings for members on a wide variety of topical subjects, while the grand old man of South African liberalism. Dr Alan Paton, delivered the Alfred and Winifred Hoernle Memorial Lecture on "Federation or Desolation" on 23rd May. Another notable feature of the year under review was the continued growth of the Institute's black bursary programme, two major new bursary contracts being signed.

Most of our research, briefing, and bursary activity was concentrated at head office in Johannesburg, but our Cape Western region also had an active year in all three fields.

As I reported last year, nearly all the Institute's specially-funded projects have either come to an end or constituted themselves as separate organisations responsible for their own finances and administration. Separation has been beneficial to both the Institute and the organisations concerned, Operation Hunger, the Open School, Using Spoken and Written English (USWE), and the Education Support Programme.

As a result both of its better financial position and these separations, the Institute has become a leaner, trimmer, and more closely focused organisation. Our two major activities now are our research and bursary work, supplemented by our series of briefings for members and the Director's busy programme of speeches to a variety of audiences. Having progressed a long way in its plans to consolidate and revitalise itself, the Institute is now much better placed both to expand its research work and embark on a programme of policy research more explicitly aimed than in the past at the active promotion of change. In addition to its work on both the 1984 and the 1985 <u>Race Relations Survey</u>, the research department kept a record of deaths in the political violence that afflicted the country during the year under review. It also produced a synopsis of the Human Sciences Research Council's report on intergroup relations and a report on the state-of-play regarding African political rights. In addition, the Institute published <u>What is Apartheid</u>?, an analysis of the key provisions of the main apartheid laws. In terms of an agreement with the Urban Foundation, the Institute undertook a year-long research project aimed at gaining greater insight into the process of political change. A survey of the black political scene, <u>Black Politics at</u> the Crossroads, was published as part of this project.

Speakers at Institute briefings were drawn from a wide diversity of interests and viewpoints. They included the general secretary of the National Union of Mineworkers, the chairman of the industry support unit to the Sullivan statement of principles, and the former secretary to the special cabinet committee dealing with the constitutional development of Africans. Forums were held to discuss South Africa's health needs, urbanisation, possibilities for an alternative education system, and liberalism. The forum on liberalism was preceded by Dr Stuart Saunders's 1986 presidential address on 20th March on "South Africa: reform, reconstruction, and the middle ground."

The bursary department at head office awarded 575 bursaries for the 1985 academic year, 313 of them for university study, 40 for study at technikons and teacher training colleges, and 222 for secondary schools. Nearly 6 000 applications were received at the end of 1985 for bursaries for the 1986 academic year, during which the department expected to make awards worth By the end of the financial year 477 bursaries had been more than R2m. These included the first American bursaries, initiated awarded for 1986. following signature by the Institute of a contract with the US government in terms of which it would administer a bursary programme worth \$915 000 over a six-year period beginning in January 1986. A second bursary contract with World University Service of Canada was signed; in terms thereof the Canadian government will sponsor an additional 40 bursaries from January 1986, the amount involved being Cdn\$790 509. I am particularly pleased to report that the Albert Luthuli Memorial Foundation Trust asked the Institute to administer a black bursary programme on its behalf from the beginning of 1986, and we naturally agreed to do this and so help honour the memory of a great son of South Africa.

The administration of the bursary programme continued to draw favourable comment from evaluators commissioned by some of the major bursary donors. A list of all the donors appears in the financial statements.

The Cape Western region had a busy year. Ten regional topic papers were produced on subjects including transport boycotts, statutory developments in local government, racial discrimination in newspaper advertisements for jobs, the president's council's report on urbanisation, and the effects of the political crisis on coloured education. People of differing viewpoints gathered at regional committee meetings to discuss some of the difficult issues confronting the western Cape, while the regional committee also made representations to the authorities regarding police action in the area. The Archbiship Emeritus of Cape Town, Owen Cardinal McCann, addressed the region's annual general meeting on 1st August. Among the other public meetings held was one addressed by Bishop Desmond Tutu and one at which Dr Robin Hallett proposed that a regional convention to plan a non-racial society should be held in the Cape. The region continued to run its African arts centre, which is manned largely by volunteers and which provides a market outlet for craftwork from both rural and urban communities. The region also continued to run an advice office in conjunction with the Black Sash. The Cape Western bursary department awarded 383 bursaries during the year. The department, which now administers 15 bursary funds, had a total of R464 508 available for bursary allocation in 1986, compared with R249 000 the previous year. It had made 333 awards for 1986 by 31st March 1986.

#### III

During the year under review the Institute monitored political violence in South Africa and from time to time issued press statements giving fatality statistics. A statement issued in April 1986 noted that the death toll between September 1984 and 31st March 1986 was 1 416. It pointed out that the figure of 171 for March was the highest monthly figure recorded since September 1984, when the wave of violence began.

A statement in April 1985 said that the use of young white conscripts to help maintain civil order in black areas led to greater racial polarisation and cast the army in a political role. The statement called for a new approach to policing in the townships and added that the authorities needed to make it clear that deviant behaviour in the course of police duty would never be tolerated. In a statement issued in July the Institute pointed to apartheid as the underlying cause of the disturbances in the townships and suggested that a body such as the bar council be requested to investigate alarming allegations of unlawful police action. It also called for the unequivocal condemnation of political assassinations.

Among the other statements issued during the year under review was one criticising the banning of two black leaders in Port Elizabeth and pointing out that these bannings were a "flagrant contradiction of the government's professed commitment to negotiate with representative black leaders who do not support violence."

In speeches to various audiences the Director called, inter alia, for a repeal of the Group Areas Act, the desegregation of education, the lifting of the bans on black political organisations, and the release of political prisoners. He also repeatedly stressed the need for a national conference at which representatives of the full range of political opinion in South Africa could work out a constitution acceptable to the majority of the people. Many of these speeches were reported in <u>Race Relations News</u> so that members of the Institute would be aware of what position the Director was taking on these issues.

On the instruction of the Executive following a discussion at the Council annual general meeting in September, the Institute issued a statement on the question of conscription and race relations. Inter alia, the statement said that unrest in the townships, springing from depriviation of rights, could not be permanently quelled by force, nor morally should it be. The statement expressed regret that a variety of black and white political organisations had not seen their way clear to becoming involved in the Indaba. It added that Council's decision that the Director should accept the deputy chairmanship was a logical application of the Institute's main aim of promoting racial reconciliation but did not imply that the Institute necessarily supported the viewpoint of any of the parties to the Indaba.

The Institute put its views on issues affecting race relations directly to the government on a number of occasions. These included a meeting in September 1985 with a delegation from the Geldenhuys committee, which was appointed to investigate various matters affecting the defence force. In addition, the Director and the Special Research Fellow gave evidence in February 1986 to the special cabinet committee on constitutional development affecting Africans, at the committee's request.

IV

During the 1985/86 financial year the number of individual members enrolled on the new system doubled, to reach a figure of just over 2 000. Organisational membership (corporate, company, and institutional membership) increased from 57 to 170, while 32 other organisations enrolled as subscribers to the full range of the Institute's publications.

The annual general meeting of members was held on 20th September. A special resolution reducing the quorum at ordinary meetings of the Executive Committee from ten to five was passed.

The annual general meeting of Council was held on 21st September. Dr Stuart Saunders, vice chancel or and principal of the University of Cape Town, was elected President of the Institute in succession to Professor Lawrence Schlemmer when the latter's term of office expired. Professor Schlemmer, Mrs Ellen Kuzwayo, the Reverend Dr Simon Gqubule, and Mr Ernie Wentzel were elected vice presidents. Council also elected a new Executive Committee, which then re-elected Mr Wentzel as its chairman and elected Mr David Gevisser as vice chairman. Mr Tom Wixley was elected by postal ballot to succeed Mr Harold Bernstein as Honorary Treasurer on the latter's retirement from this position at the beginning of March 1986.

Our gratitude is due to Mr Bernstein for his contribution to the Institute during several arduous years. Thanks are due also to our Honorary Legal Adviser, Mr Raymond Tucker, for his continuing work on the Institute's behalf, and to Professor Schlemmer for his distinguished contribution as our President during two years when the Institute was struggling for survival. I would also like to thank other members of Council and of the executive, finance, regional, and branch committees for their continuing support. In addition, the Institute is indebted to all those who supported it financially, whether with small or large amounts. Without the increased support of the Institute's membership the organisation would not have survived.

The Deputy Director, Mr Mark Orkin, resigned on 30th April but remained on until the end of the year as a special consultant with particular responsibility handling negotiations regarding bursary contracts. Our thanks are due to him for his contribution to the Institute, particularly in its bursary programme.

I regret very much to have to report that Mr Brian Bishop, a former chairman of our Cape Western regional committee, was killed in a motor accident in December 1985.

Without the support services at head office, the Institute would barely be able to function. In addition to maintaining its extensive documentation and press clipping service for the research department, the library initiated a special press clipping service on a subscription basis for members. Numerous donations of books were received during the year, and those not suitable for the library were passed on to school libraries in Soweto and the Transkei or to the University of Bophuthatswana. Equally important to the Institute is its accounts department, which continued its programme of streamlining and rationalisation, made easier by the decisions by speciallyfunded projects to go off on their own. Plans for a more sophisticated data processing system were put in hand in the department, which is responsible for the administration of all the Institute's main operating accounts as well as for 27 bursary accounts.

New systems to cut down costs and streamline the operation of our bookshop and publications outlet and shift our publications distribution service from casual counter sales to a mail-order system tailor-made for the Institute's membership were also put in hand. In addition, as funds became available, we continued improving facilities and working conditions at Auden House. These included the expansion of our word-processing capacity in various departments. I would like to record a personal word of thanks to all our staff for their dedication and solid hard work. In particular I would like to single out Mr Abner Mtshizana, universally known as Mr M, who in April 1985 completed 20 years of service to the Institute as the anchor man of our regional office in Cape Town; Mrs Connie Matthews, secretary to our research department, who has completed 16 years of service with the Institute, during most of which time she typed the <u>Survey</u> virtually single-handed; Mr John Masindane, who has looked after Auden House for 13 years; Mrs Edna Nhlapo, who has run the printing department for 13 years; and Mrs Winnie Makhalemele, who has also been with the Institute for 13 years and is now in charge of the individual membership section of the membership department. Our longest-serving staff member, however, is Mr de Vos Makgwe, who has been with the Institute for 25 years and runs the dispatch office. To all of them, our gratitude.

#### REPORT OF THE HONORARY TREASURER ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED MARCH 31 1986

I would like to start by paying tribute to my predecessor, Mr H L Bernstein, who acted as Honorary Treasurer of the Institute for three years. His guidance and wisdom has helped the Institute to weather a period of some financial difficulty.

I am pleased to report that the Institute's financial statements show a surplus for the third year in succession. As a result, our accumulated funds are no longer in deficit. In summary the income statement shows:

The balance sheet shows an increase to over Rl 470 000 in the amount of special funds under administration. These are mainly bursary funds.

In the income statement, substantial increases in both income and expenditure reflect the Institute's active role during the year. On the income side, membership subscriptions and administration fees received have each increased by over R100 000 to R299 000 and R337 000 respectively. Interest received has also increased by R38 000 to R118 000. Under expenses, publications has shown the largest increase to R146 000 from R35 000. Research expenditure has also increased, while salaries have risen by less than the rate of inflation.

After an extremely busy year the Institute's finances are in a satisfactory condition. This is largely due to the strict control exercised by the Director over expenditure and the efforts of the membership department. The Financial Manager, Mr Aubrey Lloyd, has improved the accounting records considerably. As a result these financial statements have been completed earlier than usual and the audit fee has been reduced.

My thanks are due to the Director and his staff and to my committee for their support.

The Branch operating results and their assets and liabilities are incorporated in the Financial Statements. However as the records of the Natal Branches were destroyed by fire and have not yet been reconstructed, the results of these branches are not incorporated. The figures are not material.
